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EXERCISE: Knowing and believing

Do you agree or disagree with the following? Why?

- Jason said, "I can see and touch my hands. I know they're my hands and I believe they're my hands."
- Sheila said, "I can't see my ears (except in the mirror, and that doesn't count). I believe I have ears, but I don't know it for sure."
- Dora said, "No one can see my wings. But I believe I have them, even if I don't know it for sure."
- 4. Joseph said, "I can't see or touch my mind, so I don't believe I have one. But I know I have one, because I think."
- 5. Elizabeth said, "I know my name is Elizabeth but I find it hard to believe."
- 6. Clark said, "I don't know what my name is, but I believe it's Superman."

EXERCISE AND DISCUSSION PLAN: Knowing and believing

Make two lists on the board — know, believe. Have your students volunteer items for each list — things they know and things they believe. Enter each child's name next to the item he/she volunteers so you can call on them readily in the discussion that follows. Then, as a class group, compare the lists. The following questions/guidelines might help with your discussion.

- Are there any items that appear on both lists?
 What makes one student say he/she knows it, and what makes another student say he/she believes it, etc.

- 3. What's it like to know something?
- 4. Are there some sorts of things that you can only believe?
- 5. Are there some sorts of things that you just know?
